NEW YORK, Sat. — The White House, with President Nixon's approval, repeatedly offered convicted burglar James McCord executive clemency in exchange for keeping his mouth shut about Water-

McCord, a 54-year-old former CIA agent, said this yesterday before the Senate tribunal investigating the scandal.

Living up to his advance billing as a star witness, McCord sent shock waves through Washington and the United States with his sworn testimony.

McCord said the White House dangled other incentives to him. including \$100,000.

Implicated

McCord also testified that he believed Presi-dent Nixon set in motion the Watergate burglary and bugging operation.

Ronald Ziegler, the White House Press Secretary, immediately called a Press conference to announce that Nixon never authorised anyone to represent him in executive clemency offers.

McCord sat in the Senate "hot seat" for virtually the day's session, spilling out an incredible story of White House pressure, moonlight meetanonymous phone calls and finally naked threats.
